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
2018 Maine Annual Action Plan

Maine State Housing Authority (MaineHousing) and Maine Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) held public forums on July 20 and 21 to solicit comments on the 2018 Maine Annual Action Plan. This is the fourth plan of the 2015-2019 5-Year Consolidated Plan that describes how DECD and MaineHousing plan to allocate funds for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME), the Housing Trust Fund (HTF), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program.

The 2015-2019 5-Year Consolidated Plan prioritized the following in the distribution of HUD funds:

- HOME funds for multifamily new construction/rehabilitation and tenant-based rental assistance,
- ESG funds to fund emergency shelters, rapid re-housing programs, and the Homeless Management Information System,
- CDBG funds targeted housing rehabilitation, public infrastructure improvements and economic development activities, and
- HTF funds to be used for affordable rental housing.

The award was one of the largest in the 2018-2019 funding cycle in the organization's 29-year history. The public foundation supports nonprofits throughout the state that are dedicated to the betterment of women and girls.

- 2014-Aroostook Day at the legislature with Leaders Encouraging Aroostook Development (LEAD) and created the Opportunities Aroostook website to promote job awareness in Aroostook County

"Making Maine Work"

The Maine State Chamber of Commerce, Maine Development Foundation and Educate Maine partnered to report on the economic health and quality of life for residents of Maine. Issues such as workforce development, broadband, and health care/insurance costs are among the highest concerns. Since the last report in 2010, there have been significant changes; changes from 2010 when the state was in full recession to 2018 with full employment. The report identifies three goals: Goal 1: Grow the workforce, either via in-migration and expanded participation by the existing population. Goal 2: Increase broadband by expanding and upgrading broadband service throughout Maine. Goal 3: Reduce health care and insurance costs – Maine has been persistently higher than the nation and all of New England. Read more

USDA Releases Guide to Local Food Funding Support

The <u>U.S. Department of Agriculture</u> (USDA) has released a new two-page <u>guide</u> (PDF) detailing how the agency can support the local foods sector throughout the supply chain. The document lists grants, loans, research, and other programs that could apply to land conservation, agricultural production, processing, aggregation/distribution, markets/consumers, and throughout the supply chain.

Department of Housing and Urban Development - Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has released the Choice Neighborhoods Implementation Grants program funding to support the implementation comprehensive neighborhood revitalization plans that are expected to achieve the following three core goals: 1. Maine Real Estate Industry

The Maine Real Estate and Development Association (MEREDA) measures the state's real estate industry using a variety of measures reflecting activity in both new development and existing properties. In the Spring, 2018 quarter, MEREDA reported an index of 100.4, a 4% gain over a 12-month period. The slow growth in new construction from 2007 to 2014 reflects a low inventory; however there is a demand for growth due to Maine's older housing stock and aging population.

On the commercial side, an index of 107.13 suggests the market is rising, up from 2.2% over the past year. Commercial sales price per square foot has risen significantly due to the lack of inventory. On the residential side, the MEREDA index is 95.04. Median house price rose 9.5% over the past year. The residential market is robust. Downtown Portland continues to be a hot market. Downtown condominium projects appeal to empty nesters, young urban buyers, mixed use, pedestrian and

Additionally. bike-friendly communities. mortgage originations in Maine are up 5% thanks to consumers locking in prior to rates rising and ease of banking regulations. The construction component shows an index of 88.2. This component is based solely on labor numbers available from the State of Maine. Maine-based construction employment remains low forcing contractors to find skilled workers outside the state. In addition to labor challenges, contractors are confronted with increases in material pricing and lead times. Early engagement and competitive procurement is a must to ensure committed labor and materials.

The Maine Association of Realtors also recently released a report on home sales in Maine. According to the release, sales volume in Maine rose by 3% in June, 2018 as compared to the same period last year, while the median home sale price rose by nearly 11%.

Bike Maine 2018

BikeMaine was founded in 2012 to promote the state as a bicycling destination and to use cycling as an economic development tool for local communities. In 2013, the event attracted 251 riders from 37 states and Canadian provinces and generated an estimated \$235,000 in direct economic impact. This year, the BikeMaine event is scheduled for September 9 - 15, 2018 in Aroostook County. A total of 450 riders are registered for the 320 miles, averaging 54 miles per day.

- Monday, September 10, 2018 Caribou to Madawaska

Registration includes 18 meals (you'll be on your own for 3 meals in the layover community that has ample restaurants); beverages and snacks during each day's ride; baggage transportation for up to 60 pounds; course support that includes a signed course, SAG vehicles, and mechanical and medical support; a camping village with showers and restrooms; and daily entertainment.

DID YOU KNOW!!!



On July 11, 2018, the World Ice Carousel Trophy was presented to Sinclair. Volunteers began work on the ice carousel on March 15, 2018. Three weeks later on April 7, 2018, the carousel was spinning.

March 15 - Volunteers gathered on Long Lake and began the labor-intensive work of forming a perfect circle - $\,$

- GPS measurements were taken at 8' intervals
- A snowblower removed the 14" of snow on top of the 31" of ice around the entire perimeter of the circle creating a 9' working path
- \bullet 2 x 4s were laid on the inside of posts positioned at the 8' intervals
- Auger holes were then drilled at 2" intervals inside the wooden 2 x 4s (1,340 auger holes were drilled)
- A variety of chainsaws and handsaws were used to cut the ice
- The chipped ice was removed and a chain was used to drag the trench to keep from refreezing

March 18 - Attempts to spin the carousel were unsuccessful. -25°F wind chills made the attempts impossible.

Volunteers decided to try again in April when the weather was warmer.

April 6 - A trencher from Sargent Corporation in Old Town was used to retrench.

April 7 - The 427' (or 130.15 meter), 11.177 ton piece of ice successfully rotated to break Finland's record of 122 meters.
